

Questions for the Ride Home: Stellaluna

- 1 *Stellaluna* is performed using rod and overt puppetry styles (overt means "done in plain sight"). What specific examples of these puppetry styles did you see in today's show? Where else have you seen puppets, and what styles are they?
- 2 This puppet show features different species of flying animals. Can you name them all? What do they have in common, and what is unique about them one from another? See the other side of this page for more about this topic!
- **3** The story of Stellaluna celebrates unlikely friendships and how we can be so different yet feel so much the same. Think of someone different from you. This "different" could be because of where they live, how they speak, what they look like or enjoy doing, for example. Now think of that same person and what he/she/they might have in common with you. What is an example of a time you've reached out to connect with someone with whom you don't have much in common? How did this make you, him, her, feel? How can you keep adding this positive energy to the world?

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Breathtaking Basics About Beautiful Bats!

Stellaluna features bats and birds. Though both are flying animals, bats are NOT in the same animal group as birds they are, in fact, mammals like humans! Bats have fur, birds have feathers. Bats give birth to live babies, birds lay eggs. Bats have lungs much like humans' lungs, birds have very complex respiratory (breathing) systems. Bats are incredible mammals in a special order (classification) "chiroptera"–let's take this fun quiz and discover more about what make them unique!

- 1. What can bats do that no other mammal can?
- 2. What are the two main groupings of bats?
- 3. True or false: bats have hands like human hands.
- 4. What is the name for the sound waves that some bats send out from their nose or mouth that hit and object and bounce back to allow the bats to "see" in the dark?
- 5. True or false: a bat like Stellaluna could be found in Georgia.
